Reflections on one-year as Presiding Bishop

I think I have the best job in the Church! One of my responsibilities as Presiding Bishop is to visit all of the 110 dioceses of the Episcopal Church. I make several kinds of visits – to consecrate new bishops; for clergy conferences or diocesan conventions; or for major events and anniversaries. These are often opportunities to spend a couple of days in a diocese, to have conversations with clergy and lay leaders, and to worship with a congregation on Sunday. I learn something of the particular mission and ministry in a diocese, hear the joys and

concerns of members, and make connections with ministries and people in other dioceses. In this first year, I have visited more than 30 dioceses in this way, and have touched several more in ways that are less than the full visit I would hope eventually to make.

I also have responsibilities in relation to the larger Anglican Communion, and aside from gathering with the other primates in Tanzania last winter, I have gone to South Africa for a conference on Anglican mission; and to Brazil to meet leaders from all over that province, to learn from their experience, and to give thanks for our long covenant partnership. In November, I will travel to China to meet with post-denominational Christian leaders, to North and South Korea for peace and reconciliation efforts, and stop in Guam on the way back to celebrate Thanksgiving with the Episcopal Church there. In all my travels around this church, both within and beyond the Episcopal Church, I am moved by the way in which congregations are increasingly focused on God's mission to heal the world – a mission summed up by Anglicans as Five Marks of Mission: to spread the good news of God in Christ; to teach, nurture, and baptize new believers; to alleviate human suffering; to work to transform the unjust structures of society; and to care for the earth.
